


The magazine of **Cheltenham United Reformed Church**, a joint pastorate of the three United Reformed Churches in Cheltenham, sharing a Minister, Rev Maz Allen. The three churches work very closely together, sharing this magazine, the website and all activities.

St Andrew's United Reformed Church is in the Montpellier district of Cheltenham town centre. A former Presbyterian church founded in 1885, it became United Reformed on unification in 1972. Recent renovations now offer an impressive facility, meeting the needs of 21st century Cheltenham.

Prestbury United Reformed Church is in the heart of Prestbury village on the northern edge of Cheltenham. A former Congregational chapel built in 1866, becoming United Reformed on unification in 1972.

The Church in Warden Hill is a Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP) between the Anglican (St Christopher's) and URC communities of Hatherley and Warden Hill in the south of Cheltenham. Ministry is shared between the URC Minister, Rev Maz Allen, and members of the Anglican South Cheltenham Team Ministry. Both the Anglican and URC buildings are regularly used for worship.

Our Minister Writes:



Dear Friends,

Summer is upon us! And the weather is actually warm! This is a time of exams, of leaving the security of school for the big wide world, of holidays, of relaxing in the garden, a time of change from the whirlwind of every-day living. At least, I hope this summer will give you the opportunity to unwind. When I taught in Zambia, back in the 1970's, our seasons were cold, rainy, and hot. The cold season was lovely as you could sit outside around a camp-fire or barbeque and not get bitten by mosquitoes! The rainy season was a pain for walking in mud but a blessing for the crops. The hot season was the norm, but could sometimes bring flash-fires which destroyed those self-same crops. That would be a major disaster for the villages.

The reason Kenya Projects (UK) visit Kenya at the end of December is because the rains have just ended and the hot season has not quite kicked in. It is the best time for us to work. We have been caught out twice over the last fifteen years, when the rains hadn't quite finished and the ground was still muddy. Our minibuses could not reach the Children's Home and we had to walk part of the way. Was it an adventure? Yes, I suppose so, but not one I would like to repeat.

We are blessed in this country with an infrastructure that can cope with flash-floods, contaminated water (as in Gloucester), poor harvests and, admittedly rare droughts. We will enjoy our summer regardless of the weather! Let us spare a thought for countries unable to cope with extreme conditions and peoples for whom lack of rain means death.

We are extremely fortunate. Thanks be to God.

St Andrew's Charity for July: NIEMANN-PICK (UK)

Niemann-Pick Disease (NPD) was first recognised and described by two doctors early in the 20th century. It is a group of four rare genetic disorders that were further identified in 1958. The diseases are genetically inherited and affect the vital organs of the body. All those affected by NPD, patients and families, require different types and levels of treatment and support depending on their specific symptoms and circumstances.

The Niemann-Pick Disease Group (UK) is a small charity offering support to families affected by NPD and also to professionals involved with it. The Group's aims are to provide physical and emotional care and support, promote relevant research and increase understanding of the condition. Activities include visiting families in their own homes, assisting at clinic visits, liaising with schools and social care teams and maintaining a 24-hour help line.

NP(UK) has established links with other support organisations both nationally and internationally. It is unable to carry out its own research, but promotes and sometimes funds research by other bodies across the world where appropriate making it possible for patients to participate in actual clinical trials. There is still much to do in understanding these rare genetic diseases and NP(UK) relies totally on donations to carry on its work.

St Andrew's Charity for August: RETIRED MINISTER'S HOUSING

General Assembly has firmly endorsed the principle that ministers who have served the church should have a relaxed and comfortable retirement. In some circumstances it is not possible for ministers to rent or purchase a suitable property for retirement, so, in 1979 a fund was established by General Assembly known as the Retired Minister's Housing Fund, to "provide housing for retired ministers and ministers' widows who could not otherwise be adequately housed." Churches are encouraged to support the fund, and have been doing so since its foundation. There was a major revision in 2008, clarifying the circumstances under which grants are made. The fund is administered by the URC Retired Ministers Housing Society Ltd.

The scheme was initially designed to be funded by donations from churches, but was also to be partly self-funding once it was in operation. Where there is a need the fund can provide assistance with the purchase or renting of suitable accommodation, taking account of individual circumstances and locations. Under the scheme provision is made for the continuation of accommodation for the widow, widower or registered civil partner of a minister who dies while a tenant of a fund-sponsored property.

We in St Andrew's have regularly supported the fund over the years and it is our charity for August 2016.

Hymns that speak to us:



‘Dear Lord and Father of Mankind’

Do some hymns have especial resonance with you? They may not be the one you would choose if asked for your favourite, but they are probably ones you have known a long time, can possibly sing by heart, from the heart. Hymns and worship songs have been written for many different purposes, but the reasons why they are written and their afterlife with individuals are two entirely different aspects.

I have known ‘Dear Lord and Father of Mankind’ since childhood. It is a hymn which is regularly chosen by many worship leaders – for a wide variety of reasons. Do the ideas and sentiments expressed reflect the Lectionary reading, the mood of the moment, the chooser’s life experiences, or...what else?

Unless we are prepared to do some research we rarely know the causes of the hymn being written.

John Greenleaf Whittier (1807-1892) was an American Quaker heavily involved in the abolitionist movement. He was a journalist in Philadelphia who published poetry. ‘Dear Lord and Father of Mankind’ was originally part of a much longer poem exploring the ways people have contact with the divine. Garrett Horder adapted this poem in 1884 for his ‘Congregational Hymns’.

Each verse expresses a different way of reaching God, but it is the last one that resonates with me.

“Speak through the earthquake, wind and fire, O still small voice of calm”

God is everywhere, even in the earthquake, wind and fire. Three elemental aspects of our world, all very frightening events to anyone caught up in them. I have experienced all three, at the time matter-of-factness kicked in, and I was enabled to come through safely from each event, but later prayer was required as the spirituality of each event became clear. The ‘still small voice’ came later. This can often be found in the most unlikely settings, although we tend to connect the sense with mountain tops, it could be a period of quiet in a busy day or a large empty building. Whatever our own personal earthquake, wind or fire, real or metaphor, a still small voice of calm will eventually come out of it.

Senior Club at The Church in Warden Hill

On Wednesday 18th May Sarah from the James Hopkins Trust came to inform us about their amazing house in Barnwood. They provide free nursing and respite care to families with severely disabled, life-threatened or life-limited children in Gloucestershire. There is no help from the NHS or the Government for children under the age of six in Gloucestershire.

The charity was set up in 1979 in memory of James Hopkins, who died aged 20 months, by his parents. At present 75 children are supported which can rise to 90 during the year. A holiday club operates for older children who attend special schools. This is an enormous help to their parents. Respite care for each child averages around £3,000 per year.

Sarah explained how she got involved with the charity. Her second child Ollie was born severely disabled, blind, deaf, and with a brain malfunction. The trust provided a paediatric nurse, always the same one, to allow a bond of trust to be established. Ollie passed away aged eight.

We saw a moving film where many children were enjoying various activities including wheelchair bound children using special roundabouts. Children now have sleepovers as well which can be a marvellous help to parents.

The Senior Club meets every Wednesday at 2-15 pm for a wide and varied programme of talks and activities. It would be nice to see some new faces, you would be made very welcome.
