St Andrew's United Reformed Church is in the Montpellier district of Cheltenham town centre. A former Presbyterian church founded in 1885, it became United Reformed on unification in 1972. St Andrew's offers impressive facilities, meeting the needs of 21st century Cheltenham.

Prestbury United Reformed Church is in the heart of Prestbury village on the northern edge of Cheltenham. A former Congregational chapel built in 1866, becoming United Reformed on unification in 1972.

The Church in Warden Hill is a Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP) between the Anglican (St Christopher's) and URC communities of Up Hatherley and Warden Hill in the south of Cheltenham. Ministry is shared between the URC and Rev Gary Grady of the Anglican South Cheltenham Team Ministry.

This month's Pastoral letter comes from David Black, Elder at St Andrew's



Dear Friends

Pastoral input by me on a personal level is rare as helping congregations deal with property and finance is more my field. This helps reduce the distractions that can affect those dealing with more personal matters. It is like the parts of the body and we virtually all belong in the part where we are of most use to God whether we realise it or not.

Most of you will know that I had several business trips to the Caribbean during the winter dealing with insurance claims arising from Hurricane Irma last September. During those trips I was based in St Maarten but also dealt with claims in Anguilla which was accessed by ferry so I had several trips in a speedboat for 6 or so passengers. The 10 mile trips included a section where we were open to the Atlantic and when the waves were higher than the boat it was reminiscent of the disciples in a storm on the Sea of Galilee.

We were aware of the effects of the flooding in 2007 because we were on bowsers and bottled water for a time and I have seen the damage that flooding can cause in commercial and domestic properties. The damage caused by a Hurricane of the strength of Irma was on another level because it affected everything including yachts, docks, roofs, structural steel beams and vehicles. It even blew away accounting records when the office window got destroyed. The places that are flood prone can prepare like a modern day Noah to enable them to recover faster. However the hurricane path and strength is less predictable so one can go a generation between major damage. The "hurricanes" in our lives tend to arise from problems relating to employment, family and friends. When we pray to God for the people we know whom we perceive to need help may we also pray for those we do not know whose lives have been turned upside down by natural disasters or civil wars.

As our involvement in the Christian Aid week door to door collections has reduced some members have come up with an alternative way we can contribute by having a Sunday afternoon concert with tea afterwards. Why not see if you can come and bring some friends, donations for Christian Aid. Some of the countries they help are prone to natural disasters while others are war zones with millions of displaced people.

We were reminded that Jesus was put to death not on the 'green hill far away' but most likely on a rubbish tip and far from being mourned by a large crowd, the Disciples had vanished and the women who were left, stood there at great personal risk as they may have been deemed guilty by association and crucified themselves.

On Easter Sunday the Cross was again garlanded by a wreath of white and yellow flowers kindly made by Dee Graham of St Mary's. The Cross will now stand for a little while after Easter to remind all who see it of the true meaning of Easter.



St. Andrew's Charity for May MARIE CURIE

When the Hampstead Marie Curie Hospital was transferred to the NHS in 1948 some members of the committee set up the Marie Curie Memorial Fund, in order to continue support for

cancer sufferers. In 1952 it became a recognised charity and it continues today as 'Marie Curie', providing support to sufferers from forms of terminal illness. Marie Curie currently runs 9 hospices and employs over 4,000 staff, over 2,000 of whom are specially trained nurses, and a further number are trained Health Care Assistants. Local volunteers also help, particularly in support of family members. All work in collaboration with GPs, District Nurses, hospitals and consultants. As far as possible Nurses and Health Care Assistants provide palliative care for the terminally ill in their own homes, by regular visits, or if necessary by overnight stays.

The hospices serve a dual purpose; they allow patients to make day visits, to use the facilities or consult specialists, and they have medical and care facilities for longer stays as necessary. The stated aim of all the care provided by Marie Curie is to allow the terminally ill to spend their last days with dignity and peacefully among family and friends.

In 1986 the charity adopted the daffodil emblem to help with fund raising, and every March the charity organises the Great Daffodil Appeal. Apart from its caring activities Marie Curie also provides some funding for research into better ways of caring for the terminally ill.



Data Protection

As you will be aware, the law on Data Protection will be changing on 25th May 2018. The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) will give everyone more control and better protection over how their data is used. All organisations, including Churches are subject to these new regulations.

Personal data relates to a living individual and includes obvious information such as name, address, email address and telephone number. It can also include sensitive information such as race, health and sexuality. No such data is held by your church.

Consent is required from you before any data is disclosed to a third party, unless there is legal obligation to do so.

The Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's) **Data Privacy Statement**, which is based on the template provided by the URC nationally, is published on pages 12-15 of this edition of 'In Touch'. It will also be on display on the church notice board.

The Data Privacy Statement for Cheltenham United Reformed Church (Prestbury) will be similar. The Church in Warden Hill is subject to Anglican regulations.

What Happens Next

The Eldership needs to know what data is being held by each active Group.
How is it held? Where is it held? What is it used for?

How old is it? Who has access to it?

- Once we have the full picture of what personal data is held by the churches we will seek your positive consent to continue to hold that data.
- If you have papers relating to committees you no longer serve on, determine whether they are archive (to be kept) or surplus data (to destroy). – there will be a container in the vestry at St Andrew's for papers to be shredded securely.



DATA PRIVACY STATEMENT

Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's)

1. Personal data

Personal data relates to a living individual who can be identified from that data. Identification can be by the information alone or in conjunction with any other information in the data controller's possession or likely to come into such possession. The processing of personal data is governed by the General Data Protection Regulation (the 'GDPR').

2. Data Controller

The Eldership (serving Elders) of Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's) is the data controller. This means the Eldership decides how your personal data is processed and for what purposes.

3. How do we process your personal data?

The Eldership of Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's) complies with its obligations under the "GDPR" by keeping personal data up to date; by storing and destroying it securely; by not collecting or retaining excessive amounts of data; by protecting personal data from loss, misuse, unauthorised access and disclosure and by ensuring that appropriate technical measures are in place to protect personal data.

We use personal data for the following purposes: -

to administer membership records;

to maintain our financial accounts and records (including the processing of gift aid);

to provide news and information about events, activities and services at the church;

to fundraise and promote the interests of the church;

to manage employees and volunteers;

to enable the church to provide voluntary services for the benefit of the public in our local community;

to provide contact details of officers and others with specific responsibilities (eg DBS signatories) and to provide statistics to the synod office and Church House. This enables the synod and national administration of the United Reformed Church.

4. What is the legal basis for processing your personal data?

Processing is carried out by a not-for-profit body with a political, philosophical, religious or trade union aim provided: -

the processing relates only to members or former members (or those who have regular contact with it in connection with those purposes), and

there is no disclosure to a third party without consent; or

Processing is necessary for carrying out obligations under employment, social security or social protection law, or a collective agreement; or

Explicit consent of the data subject has been given.

5. Sharing personal data

Your personal data will be treated as strictly confidential and will only be shared with other members of the church in order to carry out a service to other church members or for purposes connected with the church. We will only share your data with third parties with your consent.

6. How long do we keep data?

We retain data on the following basis:

7. Your rights and your personal data

Unless subject to an exemption under the GDPR, you have the following rights with respect to your personal data: -

The right to request a copy of the personal data which Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's) holds about you (a Subject Access Request or 'SAR');

The right to request that the Eldership of Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's) corrects any personal data if it is found to be inaccurate or out of date;

- The right to request your personal data is erased where it is no longer necessary for Cheltenham United Reformed Church (St Andrew's and Prestbury) to retain such data;
- The right to withdraw your consent to the processing at any time;
- The right to request that the data controller provide you with your personal data and where possible, to transmit that data directly to another data controller.

- The right, where there is a dispute in relation to the accuracy or processing of your personal data, to request a restriction is placed on further processing;
- The right to object to the processing of personal data;
- The right to lodge a complaint with the Information Commissioners Office.

8. Further processing

If we wish to use your personal data for a new purpose, not covered by this Data Protection Notice, then we will provide you with a new notice explaining this new use prior to commencing the processing and setting out the relevant purposes and processing conditions. Where and whenever necessary, we will seek your prior consent to the new processing.

Charles Boyer might never have spoken the "classic" quote "come with me to the casbah" so I can't use that useful cliché, and we haven't got a casbah, but we do have a tea bar, which will be upgraded to a bring and share tea.

And finally, a warm thank you to the irrepressible Owen Barraclough who stood in as speaker at very short notice indeed at our late March meeting.


