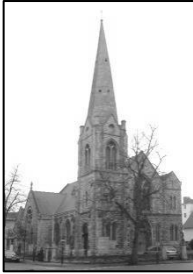

The magazine of **Cheltenham United Reformed Church**, a joint pastorate of the three United Reformed Churches in Cheltenham, sharing a Minister, Rev Maz Allen. The three churches work very closely together, sharing this magazine, the website and all activities.

**St Andrew's United Reformed Church** is in the Montpellier district of Cheltenham town centre. A former Presbyterian church founded in 1885, it became United Reformed on unification in 1972. Recent renovations now offer an impressive facility, meeting the needs of 21<sup>st</sup> century Cheltenham.

**Prestbury United Reformed Church** is in the heart of Prestbury village on the northern edge of Cheltenham. A former Congregational chapel built in 1866, becoming United Reformed on unification in 1972.

**The Church in Warden Hill** is a Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP) between the Anglican (St Christopher's) and URC communities of Hatherley and Warden Hill in the south of Cheltenham. Ministry is shared between the URC Minister, Rev Maz Allen, and members of the Anglican South Cheltenham Team Ministry. Both the Anglican and URC buildings are regularly used for worship.

### Reverend Ernest Marvin 1930-2016

Ernest followed his father into the Presbyterian ministry, serving in Bristol, Sheffield and Cambridge.

As a young minister, he was renowned for his work with young people, holding youth clubs seven nights a week for over six hundred teenagers!

Ernest also worked in America and lectured all over the world. His book 'Shaping Up – Reforming Reformed Worship' brought critical acclaim not only in this country but in the USA.

Ernest retired in 1995 to Cheltenham, remaining fiercely independent almost to the end. We remember his humour and his thought-provoking sermons with gratitude. God grant him eternal joy in the presence of his Saviour.

## **St. Andrew's Charity for September: WATERAID**



The two natural substances essential to support life are oxygen and water. Oxygen takes up 19% of the gases in the atmosphere and water covers 71% of the earth's surface. So, how can it be that over 2 billion people are expected to survive without a supply of clean water? The sad truth is, they don't survive. In the course of a single year over three million people will die from diseases associated with polluted water, or from dehydration because they have no water at all. In the majority of cases however, clean water can be made available with surprisingly small inputs of money and effort. A small borehole can bring up underground water, a small dam or tank can trap water running off hills, a simple relay of pipes can deliver water several miles, and where water is not naturally clean it can easily be made so. And access to clean water brings with it better hygiene and sanitation. So health improves, adults can get back to work, children can get back to school, crops can be better tended. But such improvements need money and people. That is what WaterAid provides.

WaterAid is a UK-based charity, sponsored by the water companies, with worldwide connections, that expends a large percentage of its funds on providing access to good water. Surprisingly small amounts of money can provide equipment and expertise, and local people provide the manpower or womanpower, wielding shovels, pickaxes, spanners etc. As a result WaterAid is completing 10 new water points every day, tiny miracles that change people's lives.

In Cheltenham £1 will probably buy a glass of fresh spring water. In Ethiopia £1 from WaterAid will buy a child's life. What better cause for September's charity donation? As we thank our Lord for our annual harvest let us help Him provide the water so many people desperately need.

## GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the URC Southport July 2016

General Assembly is the coming together of representatives from all thirteen Synods, both ordained and lay. The four-day conference occurs every two years and this year, Janet Kemp and I were West Midlands Synod delegates. In all, there were around 280 people present at the Conference Centre in Southport. Something I really appreciate about Assembly is meeting old acquaintances (including a former church secretary!) The United Reformed Church is a small family and it is good to be reminded of that fact.

The URC is one of the smallest mainstream denominations (ie. one which is in existence through an Act of Parliament), and yet we are often acknowledged by others as ‘punching above our weight.’ Indeed, this Assembly, we discussed local, national and international issues which may not come to the attention of the local congregation.

Worship permeated all business sessions as well as Bible study every morning and the film-clips from URC Youth & Children. The outgoing General Assembly Moderators, Revd. David Grosch-Miller (who came to our United Pastorate Service in May) and Mr. John Ellis were replaced by the incoming Assembly Moderators, **Mr. Alan Yates and Revd. Kevin Watson**, (Elder in Thames North Synod, and Yorkshire Synod Moderator respectively). With luck, we may have one of them visit us at some point.



The theme of the conference was ‘**People of the Way**’ which mirrored a new initiative shortly to be coming out called ‘**Walking the Way**’. I know we groan each time something new comes from Church House, because we are hardly given time to engage with it before it is superseded by something else! I fear the same is true here, but wait to be convinced by the material. To be fair, the very successful TLS programme (Training for Learning and Serving) which Bob Alger and Julie Jefferies have both completed, is undergoing a huge re-write and I assume this ‘Walking the Way’ will be incorporated in this.

## **Some topics discussed at General Assembly:**



**Authorised Elders.** Under certain circumstances, when a Minister is not available, the named, authorised Elder can celebrate communion. This has always been the case, but from now, it will be easier for smaller churches or those in vacancy to have regular communion services using their own Elder.

Our authorised Elders are Bob Alger, Julie Jefferies and Carole Pennington.

**The Wider Fold.** Ministers and members who retire/move to a place where a URC is not within travelling distance, may now retain their URC membership whilst worshipping in a different denomination. This is particularly important to Ministers, who need to be in 'good standing' with the URC in order to remain on the Roll of Ministers.

**Environmental Policy.** There is a commitment for the URC to reduce its carbon footprint (that includes us!) and to review its investment of Church funds in fossil fuels.

**URC/Anglican Conversations.** There have been two meetings discussing common challenges and decisions that could be made together 'based on discernment and dedication to mission.' A third round of conversations is now needed regarding strategic planning, including the recognition of ministers in each other's denomination. An interesting topic for the future: should the URC have Bishops???

**Congregational & General Insurance Community Awards.** Out of the four finalists, whose work we watched on film, our own Broadway URC was the runner-up!

Janet and I cheered very loudly!

**Greenbelt.** The URC has become an official sponsor of Greenbelt. A pity it cannot influence it to come back to Cheltenham!

**Same-Sex Marriage.** The decision was ratified that individual churches are able to make their own decision regarding registering their building for the marriage of same-sex couples. Although this decision was reported on BBC News, it was no surprise. Our own church meetings will need to acknowledge this freedom of choice, whatever our decisions may be.

## Senior Club at The Church in Warden Hill

Naomi Boast from National Star at Ullenwood visited us on the 29th June. She gave an inspiring talk and film. National Star, (previously called National Star College) was founded in 1967. At present there are 150 residential students, plus 50 daily attendees who live in Cheltenham or Gloucester and 900 staff. The young people aged from 16-25 years have a wide range of very complex disabilities and learning difficulties. The college helps them realise their potential through personalised learning. The college now has an orchestra. We saw them playing music to express themselves, using computers or specialised musical instruments. One student said it was mega fantastic. Students come from all over the country. GPs and the Government decide which people are eligible to attend. The Government pay a set amount each year. However, to make up the deficit the college has to raise at least £1 million a year. All-new buildings are funded by donations. National Star also runs a coffee shop and bistro at Ullenwood to help with fund raising

The Senior Club meets every Wednesday at 2-15 pm for a wide and varied programme of talks and activities. It would be nice to see some new faces. You will be very welcome.

## **Letter received from our friends at Cheltenham Minster**

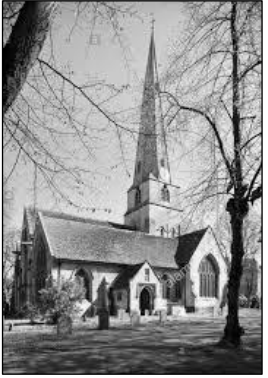
One of the joys and opportunities of town centre ministry is to be able to welcome people to Cheltenham Minster during the day-time through the week.
