If there are aspects of our lives that are 'a bit dodgy', like Jock's paint, this is a good time to take a good look at what we can do to change our lives and 'thin no more'!

# **Pensioners' Forum – Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> March – Palliative Care -** St Andrew's at 11.00am

Time ran out at our talk last month, as Ruth Baker a Solicitor from Harrison Clark covered wills and powers of attorney. We learnt that if we don't make a will your estate does not automatically go to your nearest family but you are deemed to be intestate and can create many difficulties before it is resolved. She emphasised that more women are victims of intestacy than divorce. Even if you have made a will it is important to keep it up-to-date (i.e. not 40 years old as mentioned by one listener).

When setting up powers of attorney Ruth advised us to think carefully about our choice of executors or trustees, it may be better to choose a good friend or a professional person rather than our closest and dearest.

Her final words were don't leave it all to chance, its never too early to make a will or set up a power of attorney.

Our next speaker on 7<sup>th</sup> March is Dr C Blinman who will be speaking on 'Palliative Care' and what services are available for patients and families having to cope with symptoms, pains and stress of a serious illness.

# A Service of Reconciliation, Healing of Memories and Mutual Commitment for the Church of England and The United Reformed Church

Four of us, Maz, Jacqui, Kay and myself attended the above service in Westminster Abbey held on 7<sup>th</sup> February. Walking into the Abbey was an impressive start to a very special service. This historic service was held to mark a significant step forward in the development of a closer working relationship between the Church of England and the United Reformed Church.

2012 marks the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Great Ejection and also the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the inauguration of the United Reformed Church which took place in Westminster Abbey on 5<sup>th</sup> October 1972. The Great Ejection followed after the Act of Uniformity was approved in 1662. Those ministers who, on theological grounds, could not accept the requirements of the Act of Uniformity were forced to leave and many hundreds did so suffering hardship as a consequence.

The service started with words from 'The Reformed Pastor' by Richard Baxter, a moderate and reconciling scholar of the 1600. "We must also be very studious of union and communion among ourselves and of the unity and peace of the churches that we oversee. We must be sensible how needful this is to the prosperity of the whole, the strengthening of our common cause, the good of particular members of our flock, and the further enlargement of the kingdom of Christ. And, therefore, ministers must smart when the Church is wounded, and be so far from being the leaders in divisions, that they should take it as a principal part of their work to prevent and heal them. Day and night should they bend their studies to find out the means to heal such breaches. They must not only hearken to motions for unity, but propound and prosecute them; not only entertain an offered peace, but even follow it when it flieth from them. They must, therefore, keep close to the ancient simplicity of the Christian faith, and the foundation and centre of Catholic unity."

Senior figures from both Churches and Churches Together in England took part in the service and included both Moderators of General Assembly, Mrs Val Morrison and Revd Dr Kirsty Thorpe and the Archbishops of Canterbury and York.

We covered the centuries with extracts from 'A Farewell Sermon' by John Oldfield (c 1626-82) Presbyterian ejected from his living in Carsington, Derbyshire to today with Testimonies by Revd Keith Hitchman, Pioneer Minister for River in the City of Liverpool, Revd Timothy Meadows Liverpool City Centre URC and Revd Ruth Whitehead Minister of an LEP at Wittlesford and Pampisford and Duxford URC.

The address was given by the Archbishop of Canterbury who used Ephesians 4 1-16 as his text emphasising the need for our Christianity to grow from infancy to maturity. 'We must no longer be children tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ."

We prayed for 'guidance and grace as we engage together in discussion and dialogue. Help us to be both and vulnerable, always ready for the testing work of true reconciliation. '

The hymns again spanned many years with 'Ye holy angels bright' *Richard Baxter*, 'Give me the wings of faith to rise' *Isaac Watts* and 'For the healing of the nations' *Fred Kaan*. The service closed with the blessing used at the Service of Thanksgiving of the URC in 1972.

We left to the joyful sound of the bells, feeling humbled by the history but inspired for the future togetherness of the Church and knowing we had been part of a very unique service. We each have a copy of the full service for anyone to borrow.

# URC Youth Assembly 27-29 Jan 2012

I was privileged to be asked to be an Observer for one day at this first Youth Assembly. Previously known as FURY Assembly (Fellowship of United Reformed Youth), it used to run parallel to General Assembly and therefore got lost in the melee. Holding a dedicated meeting of young delegates from the length and breadth of England, Scotland and Wales gave them the opportunity to be taken seriously.

Any 11-25 year old associated with the URC through worship or church-based activity or uniformed group, is automatically a member of FURY. It was good to be reminded of that fact. We tend to concentrate on Sunday attendance and miss opportunities at other times of the week to help young people '..discover God, to help each other grow in the Christian faith and, through our lives, reflect God's love to all' (FURY Mission statement).

There were almost 100 delegates and they discussed the charity *Young Minds*, debating whether or not to provide churches with information on mental health issues and how this should be done. They also debated whether or not the youth Assembly needed to appoint a Welfare Rep for next year. I was not as interested in the pros and cons of the debate as much as in awe of the quality of the argument. The speakers were articulate, stuck to the topic and showed passion and understanding of the issues. I cast my mind back to the last General Assembly I attended and felt embarrassed by the comparison! The FURY Moderator and Moderator elect were brilliant chairpersons.

After lunch, I was assigned a workshop to observe and it happened to be music. I didn't know what to expect, but the young minister running the workshop used images on the screen combined with either music or the spoken word and I just thought 'wow'! The songs they sang were nothing out of the ordinary – just modern – but the imagery kept the attention of that small group of youngsters.

Then came the elections. I had already been introduced to Consensus voting in the West Midlands Synod and, indeed, it has been tried out at a few of our church meetings. However, I saw it truly working at this Assembly. Brilliant! And what were our young people eager to stand for? Here are just a few of the posts: Moderator elect, FURY treasurer, FURY National Synod Rep, Online Publications Coordinator, British Youth Council delegate. At the end of the testimonies, the questions and the voting, I felt proud to belong to a denomination which contains these passionate Christians. As a colleague said to me as we were leaving, 'I now feel there will still be a URC when I retire.' Amen to that!


# St Andrew's Communion Offering, March 2012

Our communion charity this month is very much a local one, the Everyman Club in Cheltenham. The history of the club goes back quite a long way. It developed from earlier centres for people with learning difficulties, like the Eldon and Merrydown Centres and their later descendants.

Some 20 years ago the centres had evolved into an evening social club and, with the help of Councillor Jim Pennington, had set up and met regularly at the Parklands Community Centre in Whaddon. 20 years ago circumstances conspired to involve Jan and Noel Stafford, known to many of us, to take over the running of the club, and it is now a thriving centre. It was renamed the Everyman Club and it now meets every Tuesday evening, still at Parklands Community Centre. It is run entirely by volunteers, including Kevin and Nicki Jones who help to run it. The club has over 100 members of all ages from across Cheltenham. It provides all sorts of help with problems and such things as letters, and there are facilities for board games, jigsaws, table tennis, snooker, discos and dancing. There is also a quiet room with television. The club arranges discos, barbecues, theatre trips and celebrations for Christmas.

Membership is by referral from a health visitor, social worker, community nurse or someone in a similar position. Members can attend individually, but or accompanied by their carers if necessary. The centre has a bar for drinks and snacks and there is a tuck shop. The club receives no funding from outside sources and so is dependent on donations and the income derived from its own very modest fees. In so many ways the Everyman Club provides a valuable and appreciated service in Cheltenham and we can be sure donations will be well used. #### Flowers Band Concert – St. Andrew's Church

The afternoon of Sunday the 15<sup>th</sup> January, brought us a wonderful Brass Band concert, at St. Andrew's URC Church, compered superbly by Radio Gloucestershire's Pete Wilson, in aid of the St. Christopher's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary and our diocesan partnership charity in Tanzania.

The Concert by the Flowers Band and star guest Brett Baker (Principal Trombonist for the Black Dyke Mills Band), was without doubt the highlight of my year thus far... and apart from two other great events, pretty well includes anything I went to last year as well. It was simply fabulous! The 28 strong Band were on wonderful form.

Musical director Paul Holland held them in a firm but sensitive grip, encouraging, enthusing and just occasionally cajoling, for that little bit extra from the all-star Band.

Their musical expertise and sheer enjoyment in playing, passed easily and wonderfully into a packed Church, where the acoustics also played their part in contributing to a wonderfully rounded resonance.

It's difficult to pick out particular stars from the Band, apart from Brett Baker himself, but from the 8 person cornet section, the principal cornetist Andy Smith shone out, as did the guest percussionist (from the Cory Band), James Andrews, hands flying in all directions in masterful dexterity (yet another star from Cardiff University).

All of the various sections, including Euphoniums, Baritones, Basses, Trombones and Cornets were superb, with each being given solos during the performance.

The concert was brought to a close with a wonderful piece entitled, 'A Manchester Tale', a stark and dramatic re-telling of Manchester's experiences during the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War, complete with air-raid sirens, spitfires, bombs dropping and smoke swirling around the Band, until peace reigned once more.

A standing ovation brought us the wonderful Bach's Toccata in D Minor, with two encores of the same, starring all three percussionists, but especially the above-mentioned James Andrews.

Many, many thanks to Sheila Parry and her team and to Revd Maz Allen, to Isabel Hitchings and family and to everyone else who went to such trouble to organise this great event.

# Carol Singing - grand total for Cheltenham and dates for Christmas 2012.

Last month we reported some of the initial totals for the Christian Aid Carol Singing at Supermarkets before Christmas - St Andrews raised £300 at Morrisons and Waitrose, the Church at Warden Hill sang at Morrisons and there were church groups across Cheltenham involved. Joan Sampson (Cheltenham Christian Aid Chair) reports:

"I was delighted with our carol singing this year. The total is exceptionally good. We raised £3575.83 an increase of £1200.96 over last year.. But in addition to that, we seem to have built increasingly good relationships with the supermarkets, particularly at Tesco's where there has been a change of personnel. I think most of the supermarkets have already booked us in for next year. Tesco's is happy for us to do our main carol singing on the 15<sup>th</sup> December this year and then a couple of hours on the Saturday before Christmas, the 22<sup>nd</sup>, when I hope we shall be able to gather a couple of ecumenical groups. Our success this year was partly because we managed to fill more slots - a sure way of raising extra money. So please...

- 2. put December 15<sup>th</sup> in your diaries and the 22<sup>nd</sup> as well if you can make it!
- 3. give a big thank-you from me to all those who sang last December."

# **Zimbabwe Project**



Many people will recall that Cheltenham Area Christian Aid has been fund raising for a project in Zimbabwe that attracted grants from the EU to multiply any funds raised up to

£5,000 - in fact the EU will donate £45,000 to magnify the funding to £50,000. The money raised at the Autumn Fair at St Andrew's contributed to the fund raising for this project and Joan Sampson now reports that:

"We have reached our £5,000 total – indeed we have already exceeded it as to date we have raised £5,445.28. We are awaiting details from Max Khanna on future projects and possibilities and the best way to channel the surplus we have now."
